Help our Native Bees!

Plant a variety of flowers that bloom from early spring to late autumn

Don't expect our native bees to wait around until your vegetable crops bloom. Bees need pollen and nectar to live, and if they can't find flowers in your yard, they'll move elsewhere. Digger bees begin foraging as soon as spring arrives, while bumblebees and dwarf carpenter bees are still active in the autumn. Plant a variety of flowers to provide blooms from early spring to late autumn, and you'll keep native bees happy all year.

Leave some sunny areas of your yard free of vegetation.

Many native bees nest in the ground; these bees usually seek out loose, sandy soils free of vegetation. Leave a few patches of ground so they can burrow, and they won't have to travel so far to pollinate your flowers. Remember, bees like it sunny, so try to designate plant-free areas where there's enough sun exposure to please them.
